POLITICAL RESIGNATIONS

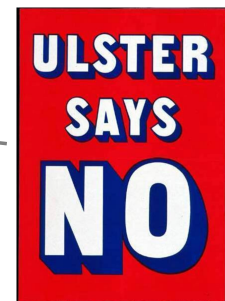
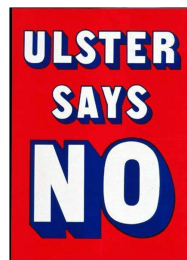
ALL 15 Unionist MPs resigned in protest and went up for re-election to show the strength of opinion. All but one got their seat returned.
